ABBY'S JOURNEY AND STRUGGLE WITH COMMUNICATION

Abby has very limited comprehension of verbal language and also has echolalia. Echolalia means that Abby repeats most of her known vocabulary. The staff at Casey wanted to assist Abby with her communication so Abby was placed wait list on Applied Behavioral for Analysis (ABA). Last summer we were lucky enough to have an Applied Behavioral Analysis worker, from Kerrv's Place services, come to the house and work with Abby on her communication skills. Caitlin assessed Abby and what skills she already had and what her capabilities could be. Throughout the summer, once a week for 2

hours, Caitlin, Abby and staff worked on using picture symbols, drawings and repetitive matching verbal language. Caitlin created a small book that Abby could carry around with her to assist her with showing staff what she was requesting. When Abby would point or make a request staff would ensure she was using proper pronunciation. This process was also used for every day life skills such as asking for water or going to the washroom etc. Caitlin felt that an iPad would expand the options for Abby's communication and Abby was referred to have an augmentative communication device assessment. Abby has been very

successful at school using an iPad and it would be very beneficial if Abby had one of her own. Abby is now on the wait list to receive her assessment and we are all excited to help Abby carry on her journey

STAFF TRAINING

In the fall of 2016 and early January 2017 we were very fortunate to benefit from training from two very talented professionals from the Child and Parent Resource Institute (CPRI).

In November 2016 Dr. Ross spent a day teaching us about working with complex individuals and helping us to understand the functions of these behaviours and how to manage them. In January 2017, Dr. Zayed helped us to understand Negative Life Events and Trauma and how to help others who have experienced such events. Both of these training events were positively received and have provided some concrete ways to improve our supports.

These include but are not limited to Conestoga College, Trios College, Sheridan College, Nipissing University and Wilfrid Laurier University. These placements provide a learning opportunity for the student as well as providing extra support/activities to those in service and an extra helping hand for the staff teams.
